Attendance Does Matter

I would like to have a written “conversation” that is honest and direct. The purpose of the following article is to ask parents to view school attendance from a different angle, perhaps. ~ Robin Sellman

One of the most important things your child can do in his young years to achieve academic success is to attend school every day. Studies show that strong attendance directly relates to strong academic performance.

Often, as parents, we’re tempted to take our children out of school thinking, “one day won’t hurt” or “they don’t do anything anyway”. In reality, nothing could be further from the truth.

Let’s take just a minute to look at two of the most important benefits of regular class attendance.

Academic Growth and Success: When your child misses even a day, it is impossible to get the exact education that he missed in the classroom—even though makeup work is done or he goes to tutorials. Real-time instruction cannot be replaced.

Importance of Education: By ensuring your child is in school, you are teaching him that education is important and that it is a priority to you. The early years are a parent’s opportunity to teach a child responsibility. Going to school is one of those responsibilities.

Sometimes, a parent may pick up a student early to avoid traffic or because it is convenient. Unfortunately, this causes a child to miss important instructional time. There have been occasions when families plan vacations during the school year. Again, I think we need to be careful about the message we might be conveying to our children about the importance of education.

Additionally, GWISD is paid daily for student attendance. This, in part, is where we get the funds to educate your child. Taking a child out of school unnecessarily hurts the school. When those funds are hit significantly, it impacts what we can do as far as staffing or supplies. It’s not just that one afternoon that your child misses that hurts, but when absences from each family occur often throughout the district, it does add up. This does affect our impact on your child’s education.

Students at George West ISD participated in educational presentations from Aim for Success, an organization devoted to helping students make good decisions in life concerning sexual activity, bullying, drugs and alcohol. Last week, the presentation for older students centered around avoiding sexual activity. Students learned about consequences including pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and emotional impact and scars that may be left by having sex outside of marriage. Important Bus Safety Notes

Please remind your child/children who ride a school bus that following the rules and being safe are very important on their ride to school or home. Bus drivers take safety very seriously and most of the rules on a bus are geared toward keeping your child and others safe.

The bus rules are as follows:

- ◆ The number one rule is to always listen to the bus driver-either on or off of the school bus.
- ◆ No standing or walking on the bus while the bus is in motion.
- ◆ No horseplay or fighting on the bus.
- ◆ No food or drink (besides water) is allowed on the school bus.
- ◆ Do not distract the driver while he or she is driving.
- ◆ Arrive at the school bus stop at least 10 minutes prior to the scheduled time.
- ◆ These are the standard rules and your bus driver (like a classroom teacher) may have other rules that must be followed.

Another thing to remember is that transportation to and from school is a privilege and not a right. If students do not behave on a school bus, bus riding privileges could be taken away.

The faculty and staff of the Primary School would like to take this opportunity to welcome you back for a new and exciting school year. We have been working hard this summer in preparation for your return, and we are excited about seeing you again. We are looking forward to seeing for the first time some new faces at the Kindergarten building. We will do everything we can to make you feel at home in your new learning environment. We would like to encourage parents to have your child in attendance every day, as it is easy to fall behind when you miss school.

We encourage all parents to take an active role in your children's education. Much of their success will depend upon follow up work you do with them at home. Please take the time to read, and do homework with your children. If the students know it's important to you, it will be important to them.

The second week of school has been very busy as First and Second grade have been administering the Texas Primary Reading Inventory. The Texas Primary Reading Inventory is a state mandated reading assessment administered to all kindergarten, first, and second grade students. The purpose of this assessment is to ensure that no child who needs help in developing reading skills will be overlooked and to ensure that all children receive assistance in learning to read at the earliest possible time. This assessment is given three times a year to First and Second grade students and two times a year to Kindergarten students. Teachers utilize this information to provide intervention and individualized instruction for students who may be struggling to learn to read.

Some of the skills measured on the TPRI include: Rhyming, blending word parts, blending phonemes, deleting initial sounds, deleting final sounds, letter name identification, letter to sound linking, initial consonants, final consonants, middle vowels, initial blends, blends in final position, and spelling.

Another part of the inventory includes measuring the student's fluency. At the end of first grade a student should be reading 60 words per minute to be considered on grade level. A second grader should be reading 90 wpm to be on grade level. Parents will receive a report after each administration.

Third graders have completed their first STAAR practice of the year. Last year's students did an outstanding job as 94% passed the Reading and 92% passed the Math assessment. Our Primary school had the best Reading scores out of a 20 school comparison group in region II. **Congratulations to last year's third graders and the entire Primary staff on another awesome job!**

Once again, welcome back and let's have a great year!

Working Together for School Success

George West Elementary School

This year is off to a wonderful start. Students have been working very hard and getting used to their new grade level. They have been checking out library books and AR goals have been set. It is very important that your child meets his/her AR goal in order to attend pep-rallies, Fabulous Friday's and other fun activities at the Elementary.

Attendance: Being in school every day means your child won't miss out on learning. Try to schedule appointments and family trips outside of school hours. Also, please do not check your child out early unless an emergency. It is very important your child is on time, here all day and ready to learn!

Conference times: Teachers are available for conference at: 4th grade – 9:50, 5th grade- 1:50, and 6th grade 1:00. Please call the office and set up an appointment if needed.

Award Ceremonies: The first awards ceremony is Thursday, October 1, 2015. Students will be recognized for their accomplishments for each 6 weeks. This is held in the cafeteria during PE times: 4th grade – 9:50, 5th grade – 1:50, and 6th grade - 1:00. We encourage parents to attend!

Home and School Connection: A good day at school begins and ends with a pleasant routine at home. Try these ideas for establishing good habits with your child:

A fresh start. A calm morning can help your child go to school with a positive attitude. Build an extra 10 minutes into his/her wake-up time so he/she won't be rushed. Also, let him/her think of tasks he/she could do the night before, such as pack gym clothes for next day, shower before bed, and/or putting backpack or musical instrument by the front door.

Backpack check. Use your child's backpack to spark conversations about school. Sit together while he/she goes through it, and talk about what's inside. Also, at the elementary each grade level uses planners. Students write homework assignments, tests, upcoming events and notes to parents in these planners. Check them daily so you can stay involved!

Screen-time limits. Large doses of TV, video games, and cell phones can distract your youngster from his/her job: being a student and kid. Encourage him/her to spend free time playing outside with friends, exercising or reading for pleasure. Note: Experts recommend no more than two hours of screen time per day.

News in Summary from: "Work in Progress: Parents Must be Patient as Teen Brain Develops" (an article from the September 10th *Corpus Christi Caller Times* in the Local section.

- Is your child having trouble with disorganization, procrastination, or impulsiveness?
- Do they stay up all night only to oversleep for school the next day?
- Do you wonder why your child cannot follow through with simple tasks?
 - Unfortunately (or fortunately depending on how you look at it), there is a reason for all of this sudden insanity.
 - Teen brains are not like adult brains (just because they look like adults doesn't mean they act like adults) and cannot always understand the science behind why they are the way they are.
 - **The adolescent brain hasn't fully developed and won't until the early 20s** (great!).
 - The part of the brain that controls **emotion** and **judgment** is one of the LAST to develop!
 - As parents, our job is to guide our kids into making good decisions on their own according to this article. Something that teens have difficulty doing.
 - **Consistency is the key:** They have to know what is expected and what **consequences** their actions have. These need to be stable and consistent as well.
 - Be reasonable but firm and don't set your child up for failure ("Teachable Moments")
 - Some things just don't occur to your child, so you have to help them make the connections.
 - What could you do better next time?
 - What did you learn from this mistake (my favorite)?
 - How much time do you think you will need to finish?
 - Remember: As frustrated as you are with your child, they are just as frustrated navigating through the teenage years. Pick your battles and adopt a mantra of "guidance" while allowing them to **make the mistakes** from which they need to learn.

GWHS National Honor Society



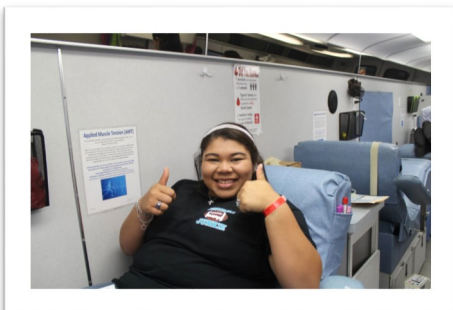

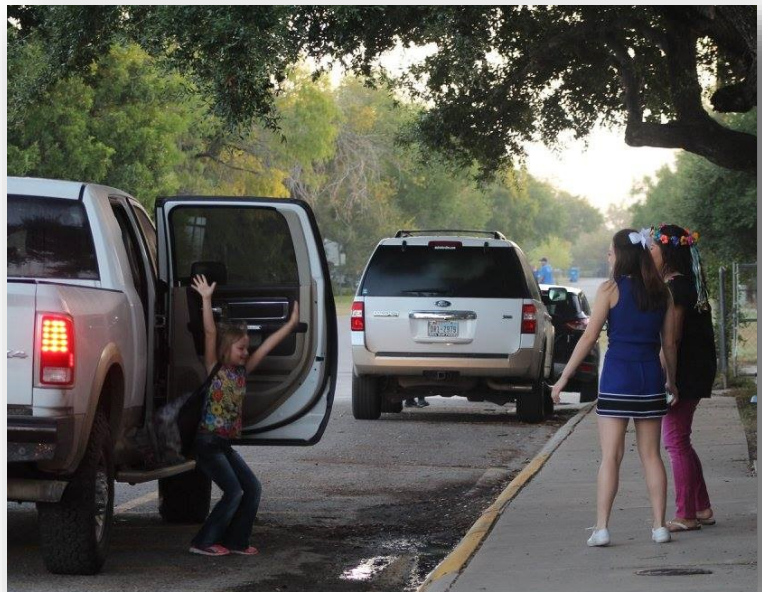

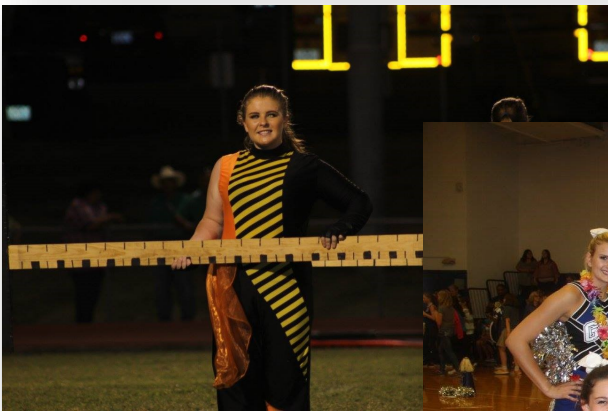
